


# Halloween History

So how did all of these traditions begin?




Halloween began 2000 years ago by the Celts in Ireland and Scotland. It was called Samhain!

They would leave food at their front doors to prevent spirits from coming inside.


As time went on, people stopped fearing the spirits, and began celebrating them. People also started doing door to door asking for soul cakes.


The colors of Halloween are black and orange.




# Spooky Swab Skeleton

Skeletons have always been used as symbols for death. People dress up as them, use them to decorate their homes, and they are always in scary movies.


But did you know that skeletons are used all around the world to help people remember about loved ones who are no longer with them?

Get ready for some spine tingling fun, and make your own skeleton!







Begin gluing 6 cotton swabs on the black cardstock in order to make the skeleton's ribs.




Glue 1 cotton swab
perpendicular over the ribs
to make the backbone. Make
sure to line up the bottom of the
cotton swab with the last rib to
make sure that the skeleton will
have a neck.




Draw a skull on the white paper with the black marker, and then cut it out.




Glue the skull on the paper. Make sure it is connected to the top of the neck bone!



Glue 8 cotton swabs for the arm and leg joints [2 cotton swabs for each arm and leg].



Cut 6 cotton swabs in half. These will make the 10 fingers and 2 feet.




Glue them in place, and put your skeleton on display!

### **FAST FACT**


The adult human skeleton has 206 bones, 54 of which are located in the hand.



# Candy Corn Patterns







# Pine Cone Pals






2. Place each spider at the starting line.











### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Cut out triangles, circles, ovals, and half circles to make the eyes, nose, and mouth of the the Jack-O-Lantern.




Glue the shapes onto the pumpkin.


The teens were really happy! The new librarian really liked their work.
